A request for review by a student classified as a non resident shall be in writing, signed by the student and shall include the following:

- the student's current mailing address;
- a written statement demonstrating the reasons why the student claims the classification determination is erroneous; and
- a signed statement setting forth all facts in support of the student's claim that the classification determination is erroneous.

RESIDENCY REVIEW PROCESS

- Return this form and your statements to the Residency Classification Office.
- The Residency Classification Office will schedule a hearing within a reasonable time after receipt of this request and will email a notice of the date, time and place of the meeting at least seven days prior to the meeting.

The decision of the committee shall be final. The decision may be made by the committee at the time of the hearing, or the committee may take the matter under advisement in which case the matter shall be decided within ten days following the hearing.

If the student is determined to be a nonresident, the written notice shall advise the student that no further procedures within the university are available; that the student may have right to judicial review in the state courts; that the time to pursue any legal action may be short; and that if the student wishes to pursue legal action, the student should seek legal counsel.
